From Father Totton's Desk

After visiting leisurely with parishioners after the 10am Mass last Sunday, I logged on to the website of Conception Abbey to check on the progress of the dedication ceremony for the new monastery chapel outside of Gower. I figured the ceremony, which had started at 9am would be nearing its conclusion by Noon. Much to my (delighted) surprise, I discovered that they had not yet



dressed the altar, so I jumped into my car and drove out there to witness the conclusion of the ceremony and perhaps to catch up with some old friends who were in town for the service.

When I arrived, shortly after noon, the entire congregation was standing outside the building as the bishop recited prayers at the entrance way. I quietly filed into the procession of priests and entered the chapel with the group as if I had been there all morning. *Four and a half hours later*, the service finally concluded! You might ask why it took nearly eight hours to dedicate a new chapel. I am compelled to ask the same question. I have attended the dedication of several churches, including the Basilica at Conception Abbey and Old St. Patrick's Oratory in Kansas City and this was, by far, the longest ceremony I have ever heard of! I am quick to add that it honestly did not seem to take that long. Through moments of silence and unintelligible Latin prayers interspersed with soaring ancient chants and litanies of supplication, the time just seemed to pass by and I don't remember anybody looking at his watch. This has been my experience in other Traditional liturgies I have attended, and I think it points to the nature of Divine Worship and what we can and should learn from the Sisters: *Divine Worship on earth anticipates how we will spend eternal life in Heaven!*

As I mentioned, last week, the primary work of the sisters is to pray. Even the works of their livelihood (tailoring vestments, farming, household chores, etc.) are subservient to the *Opus Dei*, the Work of God – that of gathering in the chapel seven times each day to praise the Lord with “Psalms, Hymns and Spiritual Canticles” (*Ephesians 5:19*)! In that regard, it is reasonable to think that they would take the length of an entire “workday” to dedicate a building which will be, from now on, the center of their lives and of the lives of the scores of sisters who are sure to follow them. For, the church (whether it is a grand Cathedral or a humble chapel) is not just *another building*, but it is dedicated as “House of God and Gate of Heaven.” (*Genesis 28:17*). For this reason, no expense is spared in constructing the church, and the time used to consecrate it, or set it aside for the worship of God, can never be considered “time wasted”. There is much we can learn from the sisters.

On Monday morning, I headed back to the monastery for another ceremony. This one – only three and a half hours – could be considered “brief” by comparison with the previous day’s festivities. During this Mass, Mother Cecilia, the superior of the community, was blessed as “Abbess” – a rare title held by only 3 superiors of women religious in the United States. This gives the monastery special standing and a level of independence in a direct relationship with the Holy See. Additionally two sisters professed their first vows as sisters and an additional 4 women were clothed in the habit and entered religious life as novices who will spend the next year in discernment of their vocation. Finally, it was announced, at this Mass, that this growing community of Benedictine nuns will soon be branching out by establishing a new monastery in Wisconsin – a sign of health and vitality.

I share this great news because I find encouragement in it that the Church is truly strong, despite the weakness of her leaders. I also think that these things point to the fruits of fidelity – they show us what can be accomplished when we stick to that which is “tried and true”, namely, when we hold fast to Tradition as a foundation for our walk with the Lord.

2. Forgiving oneself and others.
3. Renouncing the lies, spirits, and tactics of Satan.
4. Taking authority over the works of Satan.
5. Receiving the Father's blessing.
