From the Pastor’s Pen...

Christ is Risen, Alleluia! He is Risen Indeed, Alleluia!

Many years ago, on a cool Wednesday morning, I got on the subway in a foreign city and was immediately met with a concerned look from a young woman. She pointed to her forehead and I realized she must have been asking about the smudge of ashes on my own brow. I began fumbling through my pocket French dictionary trying to figure out how to say “Ash Wednesday” in French. Before I could find the word for “ash” she simply smiled as she exclaimed “D’accord!” (“Okay!”) indicating that she understood! That was Ash Wednesday 2003. I was a seminarian on a personal pilgrimage in the French capital and I had just attended Mass and received the ashes at the legendary Cathedral of *Notre Dame* – probably the most famous of the fifty-nine cathedrals throughout France dedicated under the title of *Our Lady*, the Blessed Virgin Mary.

As I write this column, which you will read on Easter Sunday, I am saddened and shocked – with the rest of the world – to learn of the recent devastation wrought upon this iconic building by a fire of unknown origin (at the time of this writing). Still, as tragic as this new is, I think there is a profound message about the meaning of Easter in it! Please allow me to wander a bit on the connection:

From my earliest years, the gothic cathedral has always been an archetype of what I think I church should be! In many ways the structure itself – especially of Notre Dame – evokes a ship – the Barque of Peter – upon the waters of the world (the Cathedral actually sits upon an island (Isle de Cîte) in the River Seine flowing through the French capital.). Like most medieval Cathedrals, Notre Dame took centuries to build, so also the Church of Christ – born from Jesus’ pierced side upon Calvary, but developing through the ages to guide the faithful to her Divine Spouse even down to our own age. Like the Church, Notre Dame has witnessed ages of Faith, and ages of secularism. She has witnessed the holiness of devout kings like Louis IX and suffered through worldly – and even corrupt – churchmen concerned only for their personal advancement. In the mid-19th century, a major restoration of the Cathedral was spurred by her portrayal in Victor Hugo’s popular novel, “*The Hunchback of Notre Dame*”. In Her time, the Church of Christ has seen revival and restoration after periods of apathy and even desecration.

Greek mythology tells the story of the Phoenix, a mystical bird which is known to re-generate from the ashes of its predecessor. It was one way the Greeks attempted to describe understand the concept of eternal life. In western civilization ,the Phoenix has been adopted not only as a sign of hope in Eternal Life, but also as a symbol of the resilience of the human spirit. Though we don’t subscribe to Greek mythology, we *may* find elements there which prefigure the Mystery of Our Lord’s Resurrection – that Divine Mystery which is the reason for our Easter Celebration, which brings us back to that cool Paris morning sixteen years ago when I received the ashes as a sign of my own mortality and the call to repentance, and this within a large medieval church dedicated to the Mother of the One who has truly Risen from the grave. I don’t pretend to know what good may come (or not) from the fire which devastated Notre Dame Cathedral during Holy Week 2019. I **do** know that the Church she symbolizes, the Church born from the Pierced Side of Jesus Christ, is called to share in the Eternal Life of her Divine Spouse. May the ashes of Paris’ great cathedral lead us, members of Christ’s Mystical Bride, not only to firm repentance, but to Joyful Hope in the power of His Resurrection, for we proclaim that **Christ is Risen, Alleluia! He is Risen, Indeed, Alleluia!** Happy Easter!
