

Dear Friends in Christ,

When Our Lord is asked about the amount of people that will be saved, I do believe that the modern question would be two-fold—saved from what and, if we were casual Christian believers, the question might seem pedantic or not worth answering because we assume that everyone goes to heaven. In our case of being Christian today, it is the latter and not the former response that plagues us. In this question, we see how we can lose the virtue of hope in two ways. We can lose the supernatural virtue of hope by despair or by presumption. Despair is when we think that we could never be saved. It is here where we forsake the power of God's mercy and believe ourselves to be our own judge. It is a sort of veiled pride. Pride in presumption that we automatically will gain heaven and need not worry about living a certain way is typically what gets us today. Notice how Jesus doesn't give a certain amount of people who will be saved. He doesn't quantify the answer; God rarely does. He qualifies it to keep the fire burning within us, the desire to live a moral life, the desire to take responsibility for our actions, to live the life of the Redeemer not only in what we say, but also in what we do. This is lost on the best of us today. In the progressive camp of Catholicism, revelation is treated as a personal possession where the needle of truth can be moved to accommodate our sinfulness. To treat Christ in this way is not to know Him at all. In the more traditional camp, word and action are divided. While we may believe, in other words, is that enough? Or is more required? After all, Jesus says, "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life." He doesn't only say, "I am the Truth." The way and the life means precisely living in the hope of gaining life! Knowing Christ is the first step in salvation. We cannot claim to love Him if we don't know Him. Faith is the first step. From faith buds forth charity—the living of the Way and living to hope in the Life. Is it enough to simply to know who Jesus is? Our Lord says that we must strive with our action.! Let us strive together!
