From the Pastor's Pen...

Liturgical catechesis on the Roman Canon, continued.

Note how the Eucharistic Prayer is composed not only of words, but also of prescribed actions. This is actually where the term rubric comes from. In the altar missal, all the spoken words of the prayer are printed in black, while the instructions about prescribed posture and action are written in red. The Latin word for red is "ruber" (from which we derive the word "ruby") and so the words written in red are referred to as "rubrics". As we come to the next part of the Roman Canon, the priest will read the following instructions, written in red: "Bowing, with hands joined, he continues:" followed by the prayer: "In humble prayer we ask you, almighty God: command that these gifts be borne by the hands of your holy Angel to your altar on high in the sight of your divine majesty, so that all of us, who through this participation at the altar receive the most holy Body and Blood of your son," The priest is given the further instruction: "He stands upright again and signs himself with the Sign of the Cross,". The rubrics also indicate when the priest should join his hands and when he should extend them in the orans position. At one point, they even indicate that he is to strike his breast with his right hand.

During the commemoration of the Dead, the priest prays specifically for the dead, especially for any deceased members for whom the Mass may be offered. While he is to pray for them by name, he may choose to name them out loud or silently.

Finally, one last group of martyrs is invoked by name. Again, these are saints who would have been held dear by the early Roman Church. I will say a few words here about each:

St. John the Baptist was Jesus' cousin, the forerunner who was both prophet and martyr, beheaded for his refusal to remain silent in the face of King Herod's adulterous marriage.

Stephen was a deacon in Jerusalem who was stoned to death for proclaiming the Lord's Resurrection. Since he was the first martyr to die after the resurrection, he is known as *protomartyr*.

Matthias was chosen to replace Judas as the 12th apostle (Acts 1:15-26)

Barnabas was another early disciple who was a close collaborator with Paul in his missionary efforts.

Ignatius and **Alexander** were early bishops in the cities, respectively, of Antioch (Syria) and Alexandria (Egypt) Their mention in the Roman Canon establishes the connection among the Churches of these 3 cities. (Interestingly, before he became Bishop of Rome, Peter was first Bishop in Antioch.

Marcellinus, a priest and Peter, an exorcist, were clerics in the Church of Rome. Lifelong friends, they were beheaded together as martyrs for the Faith.

Felicity, a slave woman, and Perpetua, her noble mistress, met the same martyr's fate as witnesses for Jesus.

Agatha and **Lucy** were both Sicilian women of noble birth. Their non-Roman origin attests to the Universal nature of the Church even from the earliest times. Both were brutally tortured prior to their martyrdom.

Agnes, a young girl of 12 whose name means "Lamb" consecrated her virginity to Jesus, the Lamb of God. She was among the boldest and bravest of all the early Roman martyrs. Her executioner was the one trembling at her death, while she approached with the calmest and most joyful demeanor.

Cecilia, a married woman who was martyred with her husband and his brother, is also the patron saint of Sacred Music. Over 1300 years later her incorrupt body was discovered and appeared as if she were sleeping.

Anastasia was another married Roman woman who was martyred with her husband.

The invocation of these saints, who, with the angels, are present at every Mass, serves as constant reminder to us that Jesus' followers, and those willing to give their lives as witnesses to his Truth, come from all walks of life. These are our elder brothers and sisters, and we benefit from their example, even as we hope to benefit from their heavenly intercession.


