From the Pastor's Pen...

One of my first jobs was delivering the *Detroit Free Press*, the "*Motor City's*" daily morning paper. I actually worked for my brother who owned the route (he was 11 - the minimum age required) but we shared the work, and the pay. Later, when I was in high school and college, I worked as a Delivery Driver for Pizza Hut. When I was first ordained, I made reference to both these jobs - When I was younger, I delivered the bad news of this world and now I deliver The Good News of Salvation; when I was younger I delivered comfort food (with little nutritional value) and now I am privileged to distribute the Living Bread, which came down from Heaven! I was reminded of this contrast by two recent news articles, one of them coming from an unlikely source, the other, a message of distress regardless of what channel it comes through.

The unlikely source of good news was ESPN - The premiere television channel for Sports which featured a piece on the story of Shelly Pennefather, one of the greatest women basketball players of all time, who renounced fame, wealth and notoriety to embrace the hidden and austere life of a Poor Clare Nun. To watch the video and read the entire article, you can access it at: https://www.espn.com/womens-college-basketball/story/_/id/27297631/happened-villanova-basketball-star-shelly-pennefather-made-deal-god The author, Elizabeth Merrill, does a beautiful job of telling a story which is difficult to understand even for most practicing Catholics. It's a story about sacrifice and priorities, but it is ultimately a story about love! Sister Rose Marie of the Queen of Angels, as she is known in the cloister, fell in Love with Jesus and answered a call to become his spouse in a particularly deliberate way which challenges our view of what is important in this world.

The other news to which I refer has been reported by numerous media outlets - most of them specializing in Catholic or Christian news. It is the story of a Pew Research study which found that *less than 1/3 of self-proclaimed Catholics believe in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist.* To read the full report, you may access it at: https://www.pewresearch.org/fact-tank/2019/08/05/transubstantiation-eucharist-u-s-catholics/. What is probably most alarming about it is the fact that, even among those Catholics who *actually go to Mass each Sunday, 1/3 of them DO NOT believe that Jesus is present, Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity in the Blessed Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist!* Furthermore, the study suggests that it is not for lack of teaching, for many of those who do not believe, are aware of what the Church teaches, and yet they do not believe it themselves! How did we get here? There is a latin phrase, "Lex Orandi, Lex Credendi" "the law of prayer is the law of believe." *In other words: "how we pray impacts what we believe."* How do we approach this august Mystery? It may ruffle a few feathers, but I will posit that belief in the Eucharist is significantly diminished by a casual approach to the Sacred Liturgy! If we believe that the Eucharist is Jesus and that Jesus is God, do we show it by our demeanor, by our dress, by our behavior in His Divine Presence? Do we reverently genuflect toward the tabernacle upon entering Church or do we awkwardly "curtsy" in the general direction of the altar or do nothing at all? Do we maintain a reverent, awe-filled silence before and after Mass or do we launch into mundane conversation as soon as the hymn is finished? Do we decorate the church in a beautiful way which calls to mind the otherworldly nature of the sanctuary or do we try to make it as comfortable and commonplace (for ourselves) as the living room in our homes?

What did Ms. Pennefather discover that led her to forsake all the world had to offer – and the world offered her a lot! As I said, she fell in love, and nothing else mattered! Her relationship with Jesus changed her whole life! Most of us are not called to leave the world and join a cloistered, Poor Clare monastery. Every one of us is invited into a relationship with Jesus—and the Eucharist is at the heart of that relationship! May our conduct of that relationship take top priority in our lives. I have been blessed to hear the stories of many friends who are adult converts to the Catholic Church. What led them to the Church? Most of them tell me it is because they fell in love with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament; they longed to be fed by the Bread of Life! Is this your disposition? Or do you approach the altar, like so many, out of routine to "get" communion as if it were merely a participation medal or a party favor?

I would like to offer a word of encouragement to all who are reading this. If it has not been your practice until now, please consider taking the following steps to help restore Eucharistic wonder in your lives and in our Church. Begin receiving Holy Communion in the traditional manner whereby the priest places the host directly on your tongue. While the Church has allowed the faithful to receive Holy Communion in the hand, this exception was made under dubious conditions and, in my personal opinion, it has led to the diminishment in the belief in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. If you have the option and you are *physically able*, please consider kneeling to receive Holy Communion, as was done for centuries, a sign of reverence and homage due to our Divine Spouse. In any case, let us *never casually or mindlessly approach the altar as if we are doing something to please others, as if we don't believe that God is present and that He comes to give himself to us in this most sublime gift.*

If you are among those who don't believe what the Church teaches about Jesus' Real Presence in the Holy Eucharist, you should refrain from presenting yourself for Holy Communion, set up a moment to speak with a priest and seek to resolve this serious inconsistency as soon as possible.
