From Fr. Totton's Desk

During this month of November, we are reminded to pray for the Souls of the Faithful Departed. This is also an important time to consider making plans for the final disposition of our own mortal remains, lesus said: "You know neither the day nor the hour."

You may have noticed lately that more and more funerals involve cremation. Many of us remember a time when cremation was strictly forbidden by the Catholic Church and are now confused. For several decades now, the Church has allowed cremation under limited circumstances provided that: 1) Cremation is not carried out as a protest in defiance of our belief in the Resurrection of the Body; and 2) Cremated remains be properly buried intact in consecrated ground (a cemetery) or according to proper burial at sea. Such cremated remains should **never** be separated, "scattered", or compressed into jewelry to be worn by one's surviving family members or even conserved in a single urn to be kept in the home of a family member or friend.

In the face of death, the Church confidently proclaims our Catholic belief that God has created each person for eternal life. In the celebration of the Rite of Christian Burial, the Church affirms and expresses the union of the Church on earth with the Church in heaven in the one Communion of Saints.

The Rite of Christian Burial concludes with the *committal*, celebrated at the grave, which is the final act of one's family and the faith community in caring for the body of its deceased member and gives concrete expression to our belief "in the resurrection of the body and life everlasting." as expressed at Mass each Sunday in the Apostles' Creed. We proclaim that the grave, once a sign of futility, is transformed into a sign of Hode.

Our Parish cemetery provides a fitting and appropriate resting place for our Faithful departed loved ones. Additionally, Catholic Cemeteries of Kansas City - St. Joseph maintains 4 major cemeteries in the cities of Kansas City and St. Joseph. All of our cemeteries provide consecrated ground for our families for the sacred rites of burial and internment.

Burial in hallowed ground offers a sacred trust, perpetuating our Catholic Tradition expressing our belief in Christ's saving Redemption and in the life of the world to come. Masses and prayer services are celebrated throughout the year in our Catholic cemeteries for our deceased loved ones, and these holy grounds will not be re-sold to other corporations since the ground and buildings have been set up with perpetual care and maintenance.


