

From Fr. Totton's Desk

The Solemnity of Christ the King which we celebrated always reminds me that, as Americans, royalty is something that simultaneously repulses and fascinates us. Being as our origins are in Merry Old England, we may think right away of the British Crown. It was, after all, in answer to the abuse of royal power that the Founding Fathers declared our independence. Rather than proclaiming some local hero - like General George Washington - our king, we instead decided that the president would be elected to serve at the pleasure of the people. Still, we have long maintained an interesting fascination with the goings-on of the British Royal Family - one of the few remaining monarchies in Europe. It is interesting that this Feast - Solemnity of Christ, King of the Universe, was only proclaimed about 90 years ago, at a time, following World War I, when monarchies were going the way of the dinosaur and modern European nations were embracing either democracy or socialism. To understand the subject matter, we must understand that the reign of Christ epitomizes a benevolent kingdom, where the monarch rules and reigns over the hearts of His subjects by His willingness even to lay down His life for them! If we are to understand Christ as King, we must understand the cross as his throne!

In that vein, I would like to share a couple paragraphs from a letter I received last month from Bishop Johnston:

These days there is much that threatens to rob us of peace. There are division, tension surrounding racism, and even the threat of nuclear war. Terrorism seems like a weekly occurrence, along with the martyrdom of Christians around the world. Along with this, many have experienced the inner stresses on their family life in a culture that is focused on wealth and comforts.

The path forward to hope and peace is through the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Despite the many churches named under this title, and our familiarity with the image, most are not familiar with this devotion which was once a part of almost every family's prayer life. I wholeheartedly recommend this beautiful devotion to all parishes, families, and Christian faithful in our diocese.

Over the years I have been asked, on a few occasions, to help families "enthron" the Sacred Heart of Jesus in their home. Effectively, this is a tangible way of acknowledging Jesus as king over the hearts of the faithful in that home. It involves a series of preparatory prayers, a short ceremony including placing the image of the Sacred Heart in a prominent place in the home, and a deliberate re-commitment of one's baptismal promises. Of course, the ceremony is just the beginning, a way for a family to boost their commitment to family prayer and to bring into focus the centrality of Jesus in the lives of his disciples.

Heeding Bishop Johnston's encouragement, I hope to promote a renewed devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus in our parish. In addition to enthroning the Sacred Heart of Jesus in both parishes, I will make myself available to assist any family who wishes to conduct a home enthronement. At this time I do not have a specific timeline for how this will proceed - but if you are interested, please do not hesitate to contact me regarding home enthronement of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Wherever Jesus is, his Mother is always close by. Therefore, I also hope to encourage a greater devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary in our parishes, particularly through the regular praying of the Holy Rosary, not only in church before Masses, but on a daily basis in our homes.

Please Note: change in procedure for Holy Communion:

Beginning this weekend, please note that Holy Communion will be distributed at St. Joseph in Easton in the following manner: The priest will stand at the center and will distribute Holy Communion (the Sacred Host) to both sides of the Church. Maintain two lines (one for each side) all the way up to the front pew. When the person ahead of you (in the opposite line) is receiving, this is the time for you to make a profound bow (or genuflection) then, you step up to receive Holy Communion. Communicants may then proceed to receive the Precious Blood from the Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion at the wings. This has been my practice at St. Ann's now for the past year and it has worked out well. In a parish as small as ours, this gives me a chance to make contact with each and every parishioner. Additionally, those parishioners (and others attending Mass) who desire to receive a priestly blessing (in lieu of Communion) may do so without having to "jump lines" as it were. Thank you in advance for your cooperation.

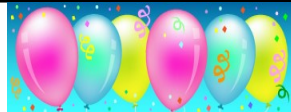
