#### From Father Totton's Desk

The good news is that somebody won the \$1.6 Billion dollar Powerball jackpot on Tuesday. The bad news is that that somebody is very likely **not** a member of St. Ann or St. Joseph Parish! Still, if we are honest, we will admit that we at least thought of buying a ticket – I thought about it, but then I didn't. Still, I thought a lot about what I would do with that money if I had bought a ticket and won! Maybe you have thought about it too! Pay off bills? No sweat! Help my parents? A breeze! Buy a vacation home? Now you're talking! The fact is that whenever the jackpot gets that big, we all think about the things we could do with "that money": things practical, altruistic and frivolous! I remember once having a discussion with a parishioner at St. James. She worked in the school cafeteria (operated in the parish hall underneath the church) and was frustrated on those days when a funeral luncheon was scheduled. She once told me: "Father, if I win the Powerball, I am going to build a new cafeteria so we don't have these conflicts with the funeral luncheons!" I have no doubt that she was serious, and it got me to thinking about all the things we could do, as a parish, if somebody donated an incredible sum of money! Still, our parishes operate not on Powerball pipe dreams, but on the regular, committed contributions of our parishioners. Since we live in reality and NOT in South Carolina, we should stop this week to think (and pray) about how the stewardship of our treasure is both an expression of our Faith and a support for our parish. Jesus says, "where your treasure is, there also will your heart be."

The good news is that our parish is holding its own with the budget. Thanks be to God! When it comes to budgeting, there are some factors over which we have no control and some others that we can control. One factor over which we have little to no control is the harvest. As a rural parish, I realize that our income is tied to the land. When the harvest is good we prosper. When the yields are low, we suffer. I can (and have) prayed for rain (then I prayed for it to stop!) but at the end of the day, we rely upon Providence to optimize the conditions of the harvest. If our tithe is a percentage of our income, it will be higher in good years, and understandably lower in poor years. I am most grateful to each and every one of you who have helped us, by your regular financial contribution and your support of our annual fundraising effort, to remain on-budget. As you know, our annual Fundraising drive continues through the month of October. If you have not already sent in your gift, please do so soon.

Though I cannot control how much it rains, I can control my priorities. When I look at my personal income, I need to see it as God's money which He has entrusted to me, and I must decide, in Faith, how much of God's money I need to keep for myself, and how much I should return to Him in support of my parish, diocesan ministries and other worthy apostolates and charitable organizations. A priest friend recently told me that he has one parishioner who includes a note on his weekly check indicating how many family members attended that Mass. The amount on the check corresponds to that number as if he were purchasing tickets for the cinema! That is not stewardship, that is expressive of a consumerist mindset (paying for services rendered). Stewardship, on the other hand, recognizes all as belonging to God, who has entrusted us to marshal these resources for the sake of His Kingdom. If each of us sees our parish as an important part of that, we will not have any trouble meeting our essential expenses.

An important coda to this reflection is the staggering amount of household debt that many of our families carry. Such debt comes from both needs (like a home mortgage or a loan for reliable transportation, medical bills) and wants (excessive credit card debt, boats, RVs etc.). If your situation is such that you are unable to contribute to the support of your parish because of such debts, I challenge you to sit down and make a plan to get out of debt. 
