From Fr. Totton's Desk

After Dinner on Thanksgiving, as I drove my parents home, my Dad commented, as we passed the local McDonald's, that there were a few cars in the parking lot. I remarked that I remembered a time not so long ago when McDonald's was closed on Thanksgiving - one of the two days of the year when they did not open (the other being Christmas). For years, sit-down restaurants have provided an alternative for (smaller) families who wanted to celebrate without going to all the trouble of cooking their Thanksgiving Day Feast. Since McDonald's is not exactly known for turkey and McStuffing, I suspect their decision to open on Thanksgiving was simply following the lead of so many retail stores which have opened to get an early jump on "Black Friday". This set me to thinking about cultural trends and whether we, as Christians, allow ourselves to be *formed by* the culture around us or whether we, by our own witness, seek to *shape* the culture around us.

Those who are older than I will remember a time "not so long ago" when Sunday's were observed as a day of rest. The Lord gave the command to Moses: "Keep Holy the Sabbath". The Jewish people did this through worship and rest. In the early Church, in light of Jesus' Resurrection, this observance was transferred from Saturday to Sunday, but observed in much the same way, with Divine Worship and a general rest from work. This is the reason we are asked to gather, as a community, for Sunday Mass, but our Sunday observance should also include a deliberate refrain from unnecessary work. This requires that we make an honest distinction between essential services and non-essential commerce. Essential services would include Emergency Medicine, Law Enforcement, Fire Protection and the like. Non-essential commerce includes retail shopping, entertainments, etc. Obviously, there are some gray areas in these question - travel is a good example of this, particularly for those who must commute long distances to make a living; foodservice represents another gray area as it may be necessary for those who are travelling or are otherwise unable to prepare a meal for themselves for whatever reason.

The Advent season is a time for us to slow down, step back, quiet down and prayerfully prepare for the coming of the Lord. For this reason, I would like to issue a challenge to you - and to myself - for this Advent season: Examine your current practice in terms of observing Sunday as The Lord's Day and a day of rest. This requires that we examine our own practice *not only* with regards to work, but also considering our use of services which require other people to work on Sunday. When you plan out your week, make provisions to take care of all non-essential commerce (grocery shopping, Christmas shopping, etc.) before Sunday. If it is possible, cook meals at home, gather with family, visit relatives and friends, interact by playing card games or board games. Gather in prayer around an Advent Wreath, take some time to share personal reflections on the readings from Sunday's Mass. Again, I readily admit that there may be exceptions to these, but let them be just that - exceptions! One may object, "But there just isn't enough time in the week to get everything done!" To that objection, I would respond that God will not be outdone in generosity. When we give him the "precious little" that we have to offer, he has promised to multiply even that "thirty, and sixty and a hundred fold in this life."

I am convinced that if we are deliberate about these practical details of keeping the Lord's Day "holy" it truly will produce much spiritual fruit in our own lives, helping us to grow in our relationship with God and with one another.


