



Dear Friends in Christ,

I am out of town today. Please welcome the guest priest from the Benedictine Abbey in Atchison, KS to offer Mass for us this weekend.

While last week would've been Septuagesima, we continue with Sexagesima (60) symbolic days) before Easter. Next Sunday was "Quinquagesima" and Lent in the Latin language is "Quadragesima" for forty days. As I wrote last week about the different "types" of Christ or precursors to Christ in the Old Testament, the Church traditionally proposes for us "Noah" as the type for this week and the seed and the sower in the Gospel. Noah and his ark with the rainbow, dove and olive branch are many times depicted in baptismal imagery. While the Spirit hovered over the waters of the deep in the beginning, God brought order to chaos .God then destroyed the world with a deluge of water, but he saved Noah and his family. While Noah is a precursor to Christ, the Ark is a "type" of the Church--a place where despite the storms that rage around us. God brings us in. The church is the ark of salvation to the world and one is admitted to this by Holy Baptism. When St. Augustine described the Ark of Noah, he described it not as an ark where only perfect people are allowed, but one in which God made for all of humanity. It is not sealed off. While we cannot be saved from the storm that rages without being the ark, we live at the same time with those who are imperfect (ourselves included) in the ark until we can be brought to safety in the Heavenly Jerusalem. As we journey towards Lent, we are reminded that the time draws near to rage in our own selves against the selfishness that has accumulated throughout the year, to let God re-order us, to let the waters drown out the sin in each of us that we might reemerge triumphant with Christ from the grave.
