Dear Friends in Christ,

This Sunday, we celebrate in the United States, the Solemnity of the Epiphany transferred to Sunday. The Traditional Day since the early church is January 6th. The word epiphany comes from the Greek word that means "manifestation." If we look at the manger scene with no supernatural faith, we see a family—a mother, a father and a child. With Faith, we see the Holy Family, Mary, the Mother of God, Joseph, the Foster father of Christ, and the Divine Child. We see that Christ is God and Man with supernatural Faith. While in the Eastern Church, this feast day focused more on the Baptism of the Lord, we westerners over time focused more on the coming of the Three Kings and the gifts that they bring which signifies in a mystical way who this Child is—the Word made Flesh—who came to mount the cross, die for our sins, and rise gloriously from the tomb. In the West, we have parsed out the Baptism of the Lord to the Octave Day of the Epiphany. And lastly, traditionally would have come the story of the of the Wedding at Cana, the First Sign of Jesus' Divinity in the Gospel of St. John. When we see the Infant lying in the manger, we do not see a natural child, but rather the Eternally Begotten Son of the Eternal Father who has taken on human flesh in the person of Jesus of Nazareth. Jesus is a Divine Person fully God and fully man with his two distinct natures in a union. He is one Person, with two natures. Let us draw near to the crib that we might adore the Divine Child, Jesus, in all of His Divinity.
