Donut Sunday Hospitality Today

Hospitality is built into the life of our faith community for the sole purpose of providing a time and space for adults to meet, visit and get to know one another socially and even begin or maintain lasting friendships.

Dear Friends in Christ,

In this week's Gospel, we hear "Peace be to this house!" This was how the Anointing of the Sick ritual began for centuries with this invocation along with Holy Communion to the sick both of which followed the sprinkling of Holy Water in the place. Before a priest enters a place and begins the ritual for the sacrament, it is important that Christ's peace is first invoked upon the place and the people who inhabit it. Jesus freely gives us His peace and order even amidst our chaotic lives. He enters into our sinfulness, our brokenness, our time of trial, sickness, etc. The caveat is that He is a perfect gentleman. He offers us this peace, but if we reject it, we will not receive it. This is what we learn from the Gospel today. The reception of the content of the Faith works much in the same way. The teachings of Christ bring peace and order to our lives. When there is inner turmoil or dissonance when we hear one of His harder teachings, it is not the Word of God that is disordered, it is the reaction that we have where we know what He says is true, but our feelings we have at the initial hearing create a resistance. This comes not from us being right, but rather trying to justify ourselves interiorly with whatever we are holding onto, with whatever is not right in us. This is true with a whole host of issues, most especially the moral teachings of Christ. Peace be to this house brings a wholesomeness, a quietness to our interior dissonance caused by our sins. For even if our sins are forgiven, they often leave a spiritual wound. We can be at many stages when we hear those words "Peace be to this house." We can reject the peace entirely. Usually this erupts in violence. This is what hurt people do. We can accept part of it and be uncomfortable with the life we now must choose to follow Christ even if it includes leaving things behind which is terrifying. Or, finally, we can let these words permeate our interior house in all of our being—body and soul. We can let His peace permeate our consciences to right our wrong thinking, to heal our past, to forgive our sins, and to create wholesomeness again.
