From the Pastor's Pen...

Following the *Consecration*, whereby, at the words of Jesus, the bread and wine are transubstantiated into the Body and Blood of Jesus, a series of prayers continues which highlights the nature of Mass as the Sacrifice at which Jesus is both priest and victim. In fact, these prayers invoke those acts of sacrificial worship in the Old Testament which were merely a foreshadowing of this True Sacrifice, the One by which man is truly reconciled to God:

Be pleased to look upon these offerings with a serene and kindly countenance, and to accept them, as once you were pleased to accept the gifts of your servant Abel the Just, the sacrifice of Abraham, our father in faith, and the offering of your high priest Melchizedek, a holy sacrifice, a spotless victim.

Let us now briefly look at these sacrifices which are recalled here: "The gifts of your servant Abel, the Just" refers to Genesis 4 which contrasts the sacrifices offered by the first sons of Adam and Eve – Cain and Abel. Cain was the firstborn, and he was a tiller of the soil. Cain "brought before the Lord an offering of the fruit of the ground, and Abel brought some of the firstlings of his flock and of their fat portions. And the Lord had regard for Abel and his offering, but for Cain and his offering he had no regard." Both brothers brought something to offer the Lord. It cannot be that God – who is pure spirit (particularly prior to the Incarnation of the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity) – was more pleased by the meat of animals than by the veggies and grains which were the fruit of the land! Subtly, however, we see that Abel offered the Lord his firstlings (some translations say "choicest of his flocks and herds") whereas Cain is described as bringing merely "an offering." A few lines later, the Lord clarifies with cryptic words:"If you act rightly, acceptance but if you do not act rightly, sin is a croucher at the door" These words are difficult to understand, but they seem to indicate that the Lord was displeased not by Cain's offering per se, but by his disposition in offering it. He may have kept the choicest grains and vegetables for himself and given the Lord those which were blemished, but whatever the fruits looked like, his heart was marred by selfishness, whereas his brother, Abel, offered the firstlings, that is the best, and he did so with great generosity! This is a cautionary tale to remind us that when we approach to offer this Sacrifice (which we can only offer because we are incorporated into the Mystical Body of Christ, the Church) we must do so not begrudgingly, or with any malice in our hearts, but with boundless generosity.

"The Sacrifice of Abraham, our Father in Faith" actually refers to our first reading for this weekend's Mass. In a mysterious way, the Lord appeared to Abraham – notice that it refers to "three men" (an early reference to the Holy Trinity) – who sets into motion an act of great hospitality:

"Sir, if I may ask you this favor, please do not go on past your servant. Let some water be brought, that you may bathe your feet, and then rest yourselves under the tree. Now that you have come this close to your servant, let me bring you a little food, that you may refresh yourselves; and afterward you may go on your way."

He then sets about preparing a great feast which he sets before this Divine visitor, even picking out "a tender, choice steer from his herd." While the meal aspect of his service is emphasized, the story clearly has overtones of an animal sacrifice.

"And the offering of your high priest, Melchizedek, a holy sacrifice, a spotless victim." Sicne I have already outlined the "offering of Melchizedek" I will only remind you here again, that this mysterious priest offered only "bread and wine" the very elements which our Lord would use at His Last Supper, gifts which he would change into His own Body and Blood, the very Sacrifice that we offer, and from which we are nourished with Eternal Life.


