Dear Friends in Christ,

As we gather on the Third Sunday in Lent, we hear Jesus cry out in the Temple—Zeal for your house will consume me and He also predicts that the Temple will be raised. It was not so much the animals for sacrifice that were getting sold as much as making money off the sacrifices that enraged Jesus. The Temple was erected as a House of God for worship and sacrifice. Many wrongfully misunderstand this text—sacrifice does require something of us—that is the point, but it is to be given freely; to disenfranchise the poor who want to sacrifice and try to make money from them is wrong. While we do have suggested donations for things in the Church to help with the cost, it would be as if one said, “You cannot get married unless you pay first.” Or, “you cannot enter the door of the church to worship at Holy Mass, unless you pay a couple of dollars at the door.” We indeed should offer sacrificial gifts for our Temple, but they are supposed to be given freely and generously.

The Temple officials at that time had made a mockery out of the ceremony of animal sacrifice by making it difficult for people to make it. When the Lord speaks of the Temple of His body, He refers to Himself as the personification of the Temple, which was to symbolically show the Heavenly Jerusalem. Now, this is fulfilled when the old Temple passes away with all of its priesthood and animal sacrifices—Jesus is both Priest and Victim on the cross. And in His glorious Resurrection, He does more than just symbolize the taking away of sin—He does it literally, because He is the Lamb of God.
