
From the Pastors Desk



What is the meaning of life? This question has occupied man since the beginning of time! It is a question which men and women of every culture have struggled with and attempted to answer through various systems of thought and belief down through the ages. Asking the question falls in the realm of Philosophy – the "pursuit of wisdom" and the various answers that have been generally accepted often fall under the realm of Theology – literally, The "word of god." And yet the only answer to this question which ultimately satisfies is to be discovered, through *Revelation* – the means by which the True and Living God has chosen to reveal, and even to communicate Himself to us. Our Lenten observance is intended to help us sharpen our interior senses to perceive, first His Revelation, and then His personal call to *discipleship*!

Some people say that the meaning of life consists in the mere enjoyment of this life for as long as we should be granted it - and they live as if even earthly consequences do not matter. These are them of which St. Paul speaks of in his letter to the Philippians:

For many, as I have often told you and now tell you even in tears, conduct themselves as enemies of the cross of Christ. Their end is destruction. Their God is their stomach; their glory is in their "shame." Their minds are occupied with earthly things.

In Abraham, we see a different approach: God reveals Himself to Abraham, and promises to make his descendants more numerous than the sands of the seashore! It was a promise of truly incredible proportions, and yet, with little hesitation, Abraham assents to this because of his Faith. He would not live to see the flourishing, or the trials, tribulations and triumphs of this People. Nor would he behold, on this earth, the coming of the Messiah, and yet he trusted that God could and would bring about what he promised. Abraham's response was to answer in Faith.

The primary difference we see between Abraham and the "enemies of the cross of Christ" is perspective and delayed gratification: Abraham entered into a covenant relationship which he understood would benefit his descendants and, through Jesus, the entire human race! - but one which would demand of himself tremendous sacrifice while calling forth great Faith; those who would be occupied with earthly things would have a hard time seeing past their own pleasure for the short years they are granted in this life.

During Lent, the Church challenges us to be sparing in what we consume (to fast), to be generous in what we share (to give alms) and to be constant in conversation with the Lord (to pray). In whatever manner we are called to implement these practices, may they truly be a means by which we grow in Faith. These three pillars of Lent are aimed at helping us to overcome the epicurean tendency of our fallen human state to satisfy baser appetites, in order to come to experience, in a greater way, our call to discipleship, literally to "pick up (our) cross daily" and follow after Jesus.





will be having their Annual Fish Fry,


beginning March 8th.
