From the Pastor's Pen...

On my recent travels to the Far East, I met a man who had two sons – okay, actually, he had a son and a daughter, but the phrase coincides with today's Gospel! Near the end of my time there, he requested prayers specifically for one of his children and expressed a very tender, but manly paternal concern for this child who, as a young adult had made some poor choices. Without sharing too much detail, I would like to tell you how much I treasure the privilege that I have as a priest, and a chaplain, whereby people who might normally be quite stoic in their daily lives are free to share with me some of the very basic human concerns that most of us have, even if we cannot wear our proverbial "heart on our sleeve." His disclosure got me to thinking about myself, over twenty years ago, at a crossroads similar to the one now faced by his child. It is safe to say that we can all identify with the prodigal son, and most of us can, at times, identify with the loving Father, and perhaps too often as the unforgiving brother. This parable provides so many layers that it is difficult not to get caught in the weeds! Getting back to my friend: His greatest anguish seemed to come from the fact that, at the end of the day, he could not make the choices for his son, he had to simply respect the young man's free-will, all the while advising, and encouraging him to make choices for good. When I think of choices – good and bad – that I have made in the past, I see that following the advice my own Dad had given me - no doubt based on his own experience- would have been the best choice, and that to disregard his advice, usually led, if not to absolute perdition, at the very least, to a rather arduous and unpleasant detour. Each day we are faced with choices – some good, some bad, some neutral. May our conscience be well-formed to allow us to choose the good and reject the bad, and in those choices where there seems to be neutrality, may we truly seek the guidance of Our Lord – perhaps through a worthy instrument – in this, we may benefit from the Mercy of God on the front end and be spared the anguish of the consequences which drive us to invoke His Mercy, abundant though it may be, after we have strayed.
