



Dear Friends in Christ,

In the Old Testament reading from Maccabees, we learn an important lesson. In the Liturgy of the Hours that priests pray, we are also reading from the same set of books of the Old Testament. I was meditating in church the other day over the reading and I couldn't help but think if we were living this reality again today. A couple of hundred years before the coming of Christ, the Greeks ruled in Ancient Israel due to the conquering of the territory by Alexander the Great. From his offspring, we have several dynasties that form. Long story short, as this happened, several of the high priests and Jewish leaders of the time were unfaithful to the Covenant and sought to include Greek religion in the Temple of God. We know that King Antiochus erects the "Abomination of Desolation" in the Temple by putting a statue of a Greek god in the holiest of places and ordering the people to worship it. That particular king sought to make friends with the culture of the time by sacrificing the revelation of God for religious syncretism in the false hope of strengthening a political reality. Do we not see a parallel today?

God's revelation to His people would not be blasphemed. The Maccabees rose up and eventually prevailed against the worship of false gods and an attempted destruction of Judaism. I've received several questions about what happening in the Church as of late with regard to the alleged worship of pagan statues in Rome and the like. Yet, God raises up people in every generation who are zealous for His Law and who refuse to offer the proverbial incense to the occult and darkness. Just as for the Jewish people who had the Law and the Prophets revealed to them by God Himself and accepted death rather than breaking the First Commandment, the story of the Maccabees is an inspiration to us to be zealous for the worship of God. Sometimes, in salvation history, God allows the worst to happen. The very worst--it can be confusing, debilitating and frustrating, but in each of these situations, God always protects those who are faithful to His commands. God often allows good things to be taken away when we don't appreciate them, that we might fight for them and appreciate them more. God loves and rewards faithfulness. Even in the worst of situations, we have the choice--obey the commands of God which are life-giving and give us happiness, or choose an apparent good which is easy and often attractive at the expense of spiritual death. The Maccabees show us that although they died in this life. they were faithful to the end and reaped the rewards of eternal life by being faithful to what God had revealed.
