



Dear Friends in Christ,

Today marks the last Sunday of the Liturgical Year—the Solemnity of Christ the King. In our democratic republic, we often don't perceive the lens of Kingship accurately, but if we look at the roots of monarchy as a government, the monarch rules by divine right. This concept was easily understood in pre-revolutionary Christian Europe. Kings were anointed with sacred chrism by the local bishop and Roman Emperors were crowned by the Pope himself giving the individual a right from God to rule. The anointing of a king or queen was actually a sacramental of the church. While the hands of a presbyter used to be anointed with olea sacra or the Oil of Catechumens, confirmandi, bishops and kings and queens were anointed with the Oil of Chrism to denote an outpouring of the Holy Spirit.

Kings were subject as Christians to the Bishop of Rome in spiritual matters and the pope as a monarch in his own right, had a duty to reprove kings and queens if they missed the mark spiritually. The government of the Church today, as much as many would feel "uncomfortable" by this notion, is a monarchy with the pope as head of his own state. Even the pope himself, though, is not an absolute monarch—he must be obedient to Christ, he must be obedient to Sacred Scripture and Tradition and has no right to change the teachings of Christ. All power and kingship has its root in Christ who reigns over all things. As baptized Christians, we are citizens of the Church and we have a duty and an obligation to promote the reign of Christ the King not only in our own lives, but also the secular sphere. We don't vote on the truths of the faith and power in this world view is Godly, not something that is derived from below by popular acclamation or whoever has the most strength. With Christ as King, we recognize that He has all of the power, the glory and the imperium or rule because He is God Himself. In this last Sunday of the liturgical year, we celebrate His reign over us and we live lives in which His reign permeates our existence—our moral choices, our participation in civic life and our homes
