Whenever we hear this Gospel passage, everyone always sums up all "religion" as being really the same by quoting the second part of what Jesus is saying regarding one's neighbor. And, at that, it actually comes from the Book of Deuteronomy. That being said, many seem to always forget about the first part—God. And not just in a cursory glance of "yeah, I believe in God," but an actual commitment to worship Him. We can say we love our neighbor all we want, but that cannot be true in the real sense unless we love and serve God first.

If we really knew what it meant to love God with all of our heart, our soul, and our mind, we would never casually answer "yeah, I already do that." If we really knew what this meant, we would say, I desire and strive to do that, but I sometimes fail. The three precepts that Jesus repeats from the Book of Deuteronomy have special import on the way in which we live. It is not enough to say these things, but we must express these tenants in our action, in our behavior and our choices. To put on Christ means that we have an actual change in our lives, that we are not dead anymore and that we don't live like the rest of the world, but our different. We worship the Lord in Spirit and in Truth. To worship the God of Israel is not like worshipping other gods. It is different. What sets us apart in the way in which we live? Perhaps that's a question we can ask ourselves this week.
